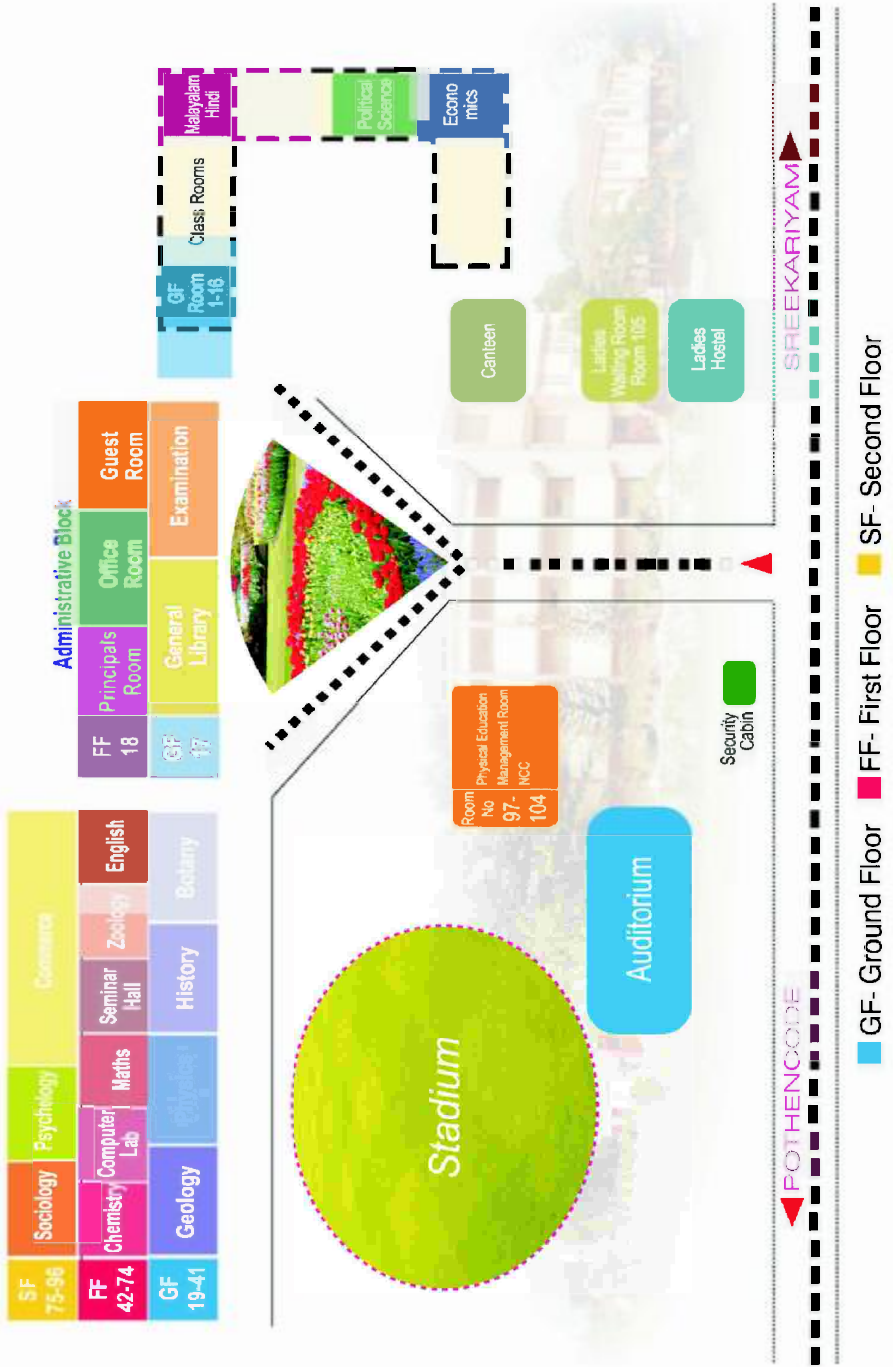

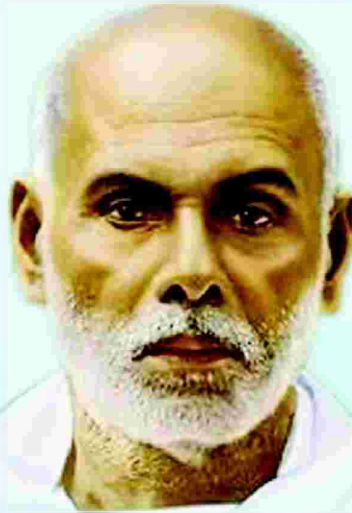

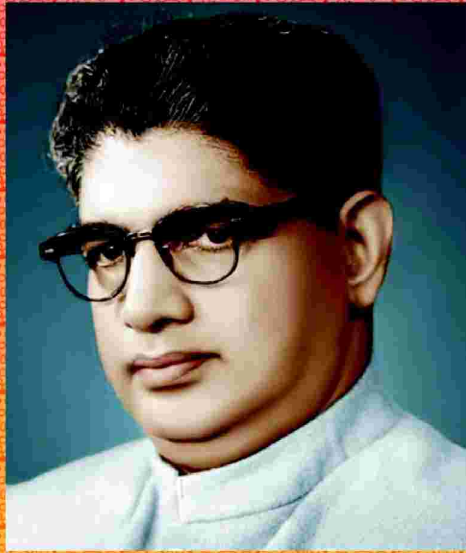

SREE NARAYANA COLLEGE CHEMPAZHANTHY

OVERVIEW

Sree Narayana College, Chempazhantny was established by the Sree Narayana Trusts, Kollam, in memorial obeisance to the great social reformer and seer, Sree Narayana Guru. Chempazhantny is a village of historical importance, as it is hallowed by the birth of the Guru (1855). It was the revolutionary vision of this great sage that metamorphosed the state of Kerala, which was called a lunatic asylum by Swamy Vivekananda, into one of the most progressive states of India. Chempazhantny, the birth place of the Guru, is ten kilometers away from Thiruvananthapuram city. The Guru sowed the seeds for a radical change in the society of Kerala and launched a campaign against social evils and morbid traditions. The philosophy and the reformatory of the Guru changed the lives of the downtrodden and marginalised people more than the activities of all other social reform movements in India put together.

The Sree Narayana College, Chempazhantny situated in an undulating verdant campus of thirty acres, was formally inaugurated on 20 July 1964, by Sri. R. Sankar, then Chief Minister of Kerala. Prof. T.C. Rajan, noted social scientist, was the first Principal. This college was established for providing educational opportunities to the young men and women of Kerala especially the members of the socially and educationally backward community. It extends its service to the members of the other communities also to the possible extent irrespective of caste or creed. The college imparts education and training to more than 2000 students every academic year by offering degree courses in History,

Economics, Commerce, Political Science, English Language & Literature, Sociology, Psychology, Geology, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Zoology and Botany. With the introduction of a post graduate degree course in History in 1982-83, the college was elevated to the status of a post graduate institution. This was followed by the M.Sc degree in Chemistry in 1998-99 and M.A. English in 2013-14. The departments of History and Chemistry were elevated to the status of Research Centres of University of Kerala in 2010. Keeping pace with technological innovations and knowledge at its frontiers, the institution undertook the computerization of all the departments, the general library and the administration. A well equipped computer laboratory with internet access, functions for the benefit of the students, teachers and researchers.

Conscious of its inceptional obligation to imbibe and disseminate the revolutionary ideal of one caste, one religion, one god, the college thrives for the extirpation of communalism, sectarianism and provincialism. It stands for enlightenment through education and endeavours to mould a humane, intellectually accomplished, morally awakened and socially committed fraternity of young men and women.

The college continuously strives to internalize and institutionalize excellence by improving the quality of its services and upgrading the available infrastructural facilities. Sree Narayana College, Chempazhanthy underwent a third cycle of evaluation and assessment by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), an autonomous institution of the University Grants Commission, in December 2022. The Executive Committee of the NAAC graded the college at A- level with a cumulative grade point of 3.01 on the basis of its academic performance, infrastructure facility, student support services, etc. The post-accreditation period has been marked with tremendous development in academic as well as creating career opportunities.

The college stands for academic excellence, development of skills and character formation based on the philosophy of Sree Narayana Guru.

FIRST DEGREE PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

1. Semester
Semester means a term consisting of minimum 90 working days distributed over a minimum period of 18 weeks.
2. Course
'Course' means a portion of a subject to be taught and evaluated in a semester. A course of 4 Credits will meet a minimum of 4 hours per week and treated as full course. A semi course of one credit will meet at least one hour per week in a semester.
3. Language Courses
Students who join for any B.A./B.Sc. programme in this college have to study five courses in English and four courses in additional language. The additional languages offered are Malayalam and Hindi. Those who join for B.Com. programme have to study 4 courses in English and 2 courses in additional Language.
4. Foundation Courses
Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes have to study one course under language and one Course under core. For B.Com programme students have to take up both the foundation courses under the core subject.
5. Core Courses
Core course means compulsory course in a main subject related to the First Degree programme (FDP) in a discipline. Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes have to study compulsory 12-15 core courses and submit one dissertation/project report. For B.Com Programme a student has to attempt 16 core courses and submit one dissertation/project work.

6. **Complementary Courses**
Complementary Course means a course in a subject other than the major subject and is complementary to the main subject. Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes can choose 8 to 10 complementary courses while for B.Com programme a student has to choose 4 complementary courses.
7. **Open/Elective Course**
Students who join for B.A./B.Sc. programmes have to study two courses to a minimum of 4 credits and for B.Com. Degree programme a student has to study 6 courses to a minimum of 20 credits. Open course means an optional course which the student is free to take at his/her will. Elective course means a specialized course from the frontier area of core subject, which he/she is free to choose.
8. **Audit Courses**
Courses which student can register without earning credits (Zero Credit Course) and are not compulsory for completing the degree programme. Courses for more than the stated number of credits (120) may be obtained through audit courses.
9. **Repeat course**
Repeat course is a course that a student repeats if he/she has failed in it. Repeat courses are possible with the next batch for failed candidates. Students who complete the semester, by securing the minimum required attendance and by registering for ESE of each semester alone shall be promoted to higher semester. Students who fail to secure minimum required aggregate attendance during a semester shall be given one or more chances to repeat the semester along with the subsequent batch of students after obtaining re-admission subjected to the condition that the candidate has to complete the programme in not more than 12 continuous semesters and that the candidate has to appear for CE afresh each time.
10. **Credit**
Credit of a course is a measure of the weekly unit of work involving lecture or laboratory session or seminar or similar activity designed for the course. Each credit hour is roughly equivalent to one hour of class time per week in a semester.
11. **Attendance**
A minimum of 75% of total attendance is required for eligibility to appear the End Semester Examination (ESE). Percentage of attendance shall be calculated Course-wise. To determine the eligibility for registration for the End Semester Examination, the average of the course-wise percentage of attendance shall be considered. Condonation of attendance to a maximum of 10 days in a semester

subject to a maximum of two times during the whole period of a Degree Programme may be granted by the University. Benefits of attendance may be granted to students who attend to University Union activities, meetings of University bodies and participation in extra -curricular activities by treating as present for the days of their absence for the above purpose on production of participation attendance certificate in such activities issued by the University Authorities/Principal, subject to a maximum of 10 days in a semester. Those who secure a minimum of 75% attendance in the aggregate for all the courses of a Semester taken together alone will be allowed to register for the End Semester Examination of the Semester.

12. Social Service/Extension Activities

Social Services and Extension activities are mandatory for all students 41 in 3rd & 4th semester with a minimum attendance of 40 hours. A Student who makes achievement in Sports/Arts/N.C.C. /N.S.S. shall get Grace Grade.

13. Evaluation

Evaluation is made by direct grading. The ratio between Continuous Evaluation (CE) and End Semester Evaluation (ESE) is 1:3. Each course shall involve Continuous Evaluation (CE) with a weightage of 25% & and End Semester Evaluation (ESE) with a weightage of 75%.The components for CE will be attendance, two assignments or one seminar and two class tests.

14. Grade

Grade indicates the level of performance of a student in a course. Grading is at Five Point Scale for both internal and external for all Courses and Seven Point Scale for Certification. Minimum D Grade is required for both internal and external for all courses and C and above for awarding Degree Certificates.

15. Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)

SGPA is an index of overall performance of a student at the end of a semester. It is obtained by dividing the sum of the credit points obtained by a student (multiply the grade point obtained by the student in each course by the credit of that course) at the end of a semester by the sum of the credits of courses taken by the student in the semester.

16. Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)

CGPA indicates the broad academic level of performance of the student in a programme. It is obtained by dividing the sum of the credit points in all the courses taken by the student for the entire programme by the total number of credit.

Grading System: Both CE and ESE will be carried out using Direct Grading System on a 7-point scale as given below:

- ❖ Habitual negligence in college work, dishonesty, obscenity in word or any other acts of misconduct will result in severe disciplinary action
- ❖ Students are forbidden from making any graffiti (Marking as initials or slogans) on the furniture or on the walls of the college
- ❖ Students are expected to maintain decency and decorum in dress and behaviour.

- ❖ Nobody shall disrupt the academic atmosphere of the college under any circumstances – such misconduct would entail major punishment including expulsion from college, and if necessary, criminal prosecution also will be invoked
- ❖ Students should wear duly signed identity cards and show them whenever the authorities demand
- ❖ The educational concession extended and the scholarships awarded are liable to be forfeited for misconduct
- ❖ Smoking and use of illicit drugs are strictly prohibited in the campus. Use of intoxicants like liquor, pan masala, etc., is strictly banned. Offenders will have to face strict disciplinary action
- ❖ Any complaint of misbehaviour will be seriously dealt with. Resorting to use of vulgar words and comments to opposite sex will cause serious action
- ❖ Any student who is persistently insubordinate, who is repeatedly or willfully mischievous, who is guilty of fraud or malpractice in connection with examinations or who, in the opinion of the Principal, is likely to have an unwholesome influence on his fellow students, shall be removed from the roll
- ❖ All legal and reasonable grievance of the students will be addressed by the college authorities. In the event of any such grievance, the aggrieved can approach the respective faculty advisor of the Students' Grievance Redressal Cell
- ❖ Students should not misuse social media for tarnishing the reputation of the Institution /other students/ teachers / non-teaching staff.
- ❖ Abusive usage of mobile phones is strictly prohibited; violation of the same shall attract stringent disciplinary action based on the gravity of the crime. Library rules and Laboratory instructions should be strictly complied by the students and they should act in a responsible manner.

PREVENTION OF RAGGING

(Vide No. F.1- 16/2007 (CPP-II) dt 13 April 2009)

1. Ragging in all its forms is prohibited in the College campus, including the departments, all its premises (academic, residential, sports, canteen, hostel, restrooms, etc.), within the campus or outside it and all means of transportation whether public or private
2. The provisions of the Act of the Central Government and/or the State Governments will consider ragging as a cognizable offence under the law on a par with rape and other atrocities against women and ill- treatment of

persons belonging to the SC/ST

3. Ragging is prohibited by law. It is a non-bailable criminal offence and punishable with rigorous imprisonment up to seven years
4. Students shall not indulge in any of the following activities, which are treated as ragging:
 5. Any act that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of a student
 6. Exploiting the service of a junior student by a senior student or a group of senior students
 7. Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a junior student including fund-raising for organizations
 8. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: annoying, playing practical jokes, sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts or gestures
 5. Any act of abuse by spoken words, emails, SMS, or any other means
 6. Any word or act that causes hurt to the dignity of the individual
 7. Entering without permission into any class other than the one assigned to a student
 8. Forcing a student to boycott class without his/her consent to participate in strike, demonstration, dharna, etc.
 9. The complaints or information with regard to ragging could be oral or written and even from third parties
 10. The burden/responsibility of proving his/her innocence rests with the accused
 11. Complaints can be lodged with the Principal, staff members or any of the members of the Anti-Ragging Committee
 12. In the event of a student being booked in a criminal offence and being suspended from the college, he / she will be re-instated only after his/ her obtaining clearance certificate from the concerned police officer

ETHICS

1. Timeliness: Students must follow the calendar of working days and the time schedule of the College.
2. Sincerity: Attend every class with attitude and aptitude.
3. Cleanliness: Cleanliness is next to Godliness. Keep the campus clean. Don't throw any waste inside the campus. Instead, segregate organic and inorganic waste using respective dustbins kept for the purpose.

4. Discipline: After the first bell in the morning, every student must be in the classroom. Observe silence during Prayer. Keep silence in the library. Learn to give respect and take respect.
5. Modesty: Maintain modesty in dress.
6. Utilize library during lunch break and free hours
7. Actively participate in the extra-curricular activities like NSS, NCC, Clubs, Associations, etc.
8. Encourage parents to visit the College periodically
9. Park students' vehicles in the area provided
10. Pay attention to the notifications appearing on the notice boards

MORNING PRAYER AND CLASS HOURS

1. Before the commencement of classes in the morning, the Daiva Dasakam (prayer of humanity) is played on the public address system spreading the preaching of Sree Narayana Guru.
2. Staff and students shall stand in reverential silence during its soothing and melodious rendering
3. The college works under the full day system with two sessions. In between the two sessions there will be a noon interval of 45 minutes.
4. Besides lecture classes, there will be seminars, tutorials, group discussions, counseling sessions, etc.

ATTENDANCE

1. Regular attendance is compulsory
2. Students have to get prior permission for leave with leave form duly countersigned by the guardian or parent
3. Teachers mark the attendance at the beginning of each period. If a student is absent for one period in a session, it will be treated as half day's absence and for another period in the next session same day will be treated as one full day's absence
4. Every working day, irrespective of the working periods, shall be considered as a full working day
5. Changes will be affected as per the decision of College council
6. At the end of each semester, a list will be put up on the general Notice Board, showing the number of days of attendance lost by each student till then.
7. The student will not be allowed for registration for examination if he/ she fails to secure at least 75% attendance for the semester

COLLEGE IDENTITY CARD

1. A College Identity Card will be issued to the student at the time of admission
2. It is the responsibility of the student to see that the card is duly attested by the Principal
3. The student should wear this card while in the campus and produce the same on demand for inspection by any staff member
4. If the card is lost, a duplicate can be obtained on payment of Rs 50/-
5. It may be born in mind that the College Identity Card will be required in many occasions such as voting at the College Union Election, claiming hall tickets, mark lists, certificates, scholarships, stipends, etc and hence the same should be maintained with due importance.

COLLEGE CANTEEN

The College Canteen provides vegetarian and non vegetarian food to staff and students at subsidised rates.

COLLEGE HOSTEL

The College provides lodging facilities for girls students in the women's hostel in the campus constructed under the 10th plan of UGC.

FEE STRUCTURE

Tuition fee will be collected in two installments, semester wise. Special fees, caution deposit, etc shall be paid in lumpsum at the time of admission together with the first instalment of tuition fee. Tuition fee is payable on the due dates prescribed. If any students fails to pay fees on the due date he/she shall be liable to pay the fees along with a fine of Rs. 10/- on or before the due date. Defaulters will be removed from the rolls.

B.A. Degree - Registration Fee Rs.50/-, Caution Deposit- Rs.360/-, Special Fee per annum. Rs.500/- Tuition Fee Per annum Rs.1000/-, University Fee Rs. 760/- B. Sc. Degree - Registration Fee Rs.50/-, Caution Deposit- Rs.360/-, Special Fee per annum. Rs.1050/- (Except Mathematics & Geology Rs. 650/-) Tuition Fee Per annum Rs.1000/-, University Fee Rs. 760/- B. Com. Degree - Registration Fee Rs.50/-, Caution Deposit- Rs.360/-, Special Fee per annum. Rs.500/- Tuition Fee Per annum Rs.1000/-, University Fee Rs. 760/- M.A & MSc. Degree - Registration Fee Rs.50/-, Caution Deposit- Rs.600, Special Fee per annum for M.A Rs.570/- and for M.Sc Rs. 1770/- Tuition Fee Per annum Rs.1800/-, University Fee Rs. 710/- Above mentioned fees are subject to periodical revisions by Government/ University.

FEE CONCESSION

Students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/SEBC are eligible for fee concession. Concessions will also be available to forward community (FC) students as per provisions of the Kumara Pillai Commission Report. (Annual income limited to Rs. 1,00,000/- for UG and for PG). Students eligible for fee concession shall submit applications to the Principal within 15 days of their admission.

CAUTION DEPOSIT

As per GO. M.S. No. 58/75/H.Edn. dated 04-04-1975, every student except SC/ST and OEC shall pay the caution deposit prescribed for each course. At the end of the course of study the caution deposit will be refunded on receipt of application, after deducting dues if any.

ISSUE OF TRANSFER AND CONDUCT CERTIFICATE

Transfer Certificate: A student applying for a T.C. shall not be given the certificate except on payment of all fees or other money due or such portion thereof as the principal may see fit to demand for the academic year in which the student was last enrolled.

Transfer Certificates of students who have appeared for a University Examination will ordinarily be issued to them only after the publication of the result of the examination.

Late applicants have to pay a penalty Rs.50/- and a fee of Rs.100/- will be charged for the issue of a duplicate of Transfer Certificate.

Conduct Certificate: Any student who leaves the college without the written permission of the principal before completing his/her course will not be issued a certificate of character. Any student who discontinues his/her study in the college without returning book issued to him/her or without paying any arrears or other dues shall receive no certificate of character or any other certificate. A fee of Re. 10/- one will be charged for the issue of certificates from the college.

COLLEGE OFFICE HOURS

The College Office Functions from 9.30 a.m to 4.30 p.m on all working days.

COLLEGE UNION

Every Year the students elect a College Union Chairman, Vice-chairman, Sree Narayana College, Chempazhanchy Academic Calendar 2022-23. Two University Union Councilors, General Secretary, Arts Club Secretary, Magazine Editor, Lady Representatives, Class Representatives and Secretaries to the various Associations. All the co-curricular activities of the College are organized and conducted by the College Union under the guidance of the staff advisor. The

election and activities of the College Union will be as per the Government and University rules.

GENERAL LIBRARY AND READING ROOM

1. There is a full fledged, well equipped library.
2. All members of the staff are members of the library.
3. Library remains open from 9 am to 4.30 pm on all working days.
4. Silence shall be strictly observed in the library.
5. Mobile phones are strictly prohibited inside the library.
6. Students are required to produce their identity cards to enter the library
7. Issued books shall be returned within a fortnight and they can be re issued for another term. The book shall be recalled at any time even before the expiry date.
8. Periodicals and books in the Reference section will not be lent out. They may be referred inside the library, by submitting the identity card.
9. A student at the degree level will be issued 3 books and 5 books at the P.G level
10. A member can avail books from the library by producing his/her identity card at the issue counter for proper verification.
11. A member will have to put his/her signature in the issue register both at the time of issuing and returning the book.
12. Borrowers will be held responsible for any damage caused to the book. When a book is issued to a member, it is presumed that it is in good condition, unless and otherwise pointed out.
13. Students are not allowed to sub-lend the book.
14. Do not make any marking or underline in the books and periodicals or disfigure them in any other way
15. If a book is damaged or lost by a member, he/she will have to replace it with fine. Defaulter shall pay three times of the cost of the book.
16. A member who fails to return a book on due date will be fined Re.1 per day until the book is returned.
17. All books must be returned to the library at the time of sending certificates for the examinations.
18. Before applying for any certificate from the college, members have to get clearance certificate from the library
19. Students are liable to forfeit their membership of the library for violating the library rules, indiscipline or misbehaviour.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND ENDOWMENTS

1. Kerala State Higher Education Council Scholarship:
Eligibility: For SC/ST 45% in Science and 40% in other subjects. For others 50% in Science and 45% in other subjects. Scholarship Amount: For UG Rs. 12000 for first year; Rs. 18000 for second year, and Rs. 24000 for final year per annum. For PG Rs. 40000 for first year and Rs. 60000 for second year.
2. Post Matric Scholarship (PMS) for minorities : Eligibility Students belonging to economically weaker sections of minority community (Muslims and Christians). 50% or equivalent grade in the previous final examination and the annual income of the parents/ guardian from all sources should not exceed Rs. 2 lakhs. Scholarship Amount: Rs. 3000 per annum for UG and PG students.
3. Central Sector Scholarship (CSS): Eligibility: applicant should have passed the Senior School Certificate Examination conducted by CBSE and have secured the total aggregate marks (in first five subjects) equal or above the following minimum marks as per the stream opted by the applicant. Science: 418 Commerce: 396 Others: 332 (For all categories: SC/ST/ OBC/ UR). Annual income of the parents/guardian from all sources should not exceed Rs. 4.50 lakhs. Scholarship Amount: For UG Rs. 1000 per month and For PG Rs. 2000 per month.
4. State Merit Scholarship (SMS): Eligibility: applicant should have scored 50% or above in the qualifying exam and should be first year student of UG or PG Annual income of the parents/guardian from all sources should not exceed to Rs. 1 lakh. Scholarship Amount: For UG Rs. 1250 per annum. For PG Rs. 1500 per annum.
5. Merit Scholarship to the Children of School Teachers (MSCT): Eligibility: Children of Primary and Secondary School Teachers only are eligible. Scholarship Amount: For UG and PG Rs. 50 per month.
6. Hindi Scholarship (HS): Eligibility: Hindi must be one of the subjects in the present studying course. Only I year students are eligible for applying the scholarship. Scholarship Amount: For UG Rs. 500 per month. For PG Rs. 1000 Per month.
7. Muslim Nadar Girls Scholarship (MNS): Eligibility: should be first year 79 girl student of UG and should belong to BPL family and Backward Community. Annual income of the parent/guardian should not exceed Rs.18000 per annum. Scholarship Amount: For UG Rs. 125 per annum.
8. Sanskrit Scholarship (SSE): Eligibility: Sanskrit must be one of the subjects in the present studying course. Only I year students are eligible for applying the scholarship. Scholarship Amount: For UG and PG Rs.200 per month.
9. Suvarna Jubilee Merit Scholarship (SJMS): Eligibility: should be first year

- students of UG or PG. should belong to BPL family. Should have scored 50% or above in the qualifying examination. Scholarship Amount: For UG and PG Rs. 10000 per annum.
10. C.H. Muhammed Koya Scholarship (MGS): Eligibility: should belong to Muslim, Latin, Converted Christian Community and should be a native of Kerala. Should be a girl student studying for the first year graduation or higher courses. Should have scored 50% or above in the qualifying examination. Annual income of the parent/ guardian should not exceed Rs. 4.50 lakhs. Scholarship Amount: For UG Rs. 4000 per annum. For PG Rs. 5000 Per annum.
 11. Blind/PH Scholarship (BPHFC): Eligibility: Blind/PH/Deaf students studying in UG and PG Financial support Fee Charges for Blind students with family annual income below Rs. 2.5 lakhs. Hostel charges for all PH students who are hostellers and whose family annual income is below Rs. 4.50 lakhs. Boarding charges for all PH students who are day scholars and whose family annual income is below Rs. 4.50 lakhs.
 12. Indira Gandhi Scholarship for Single Girl Child: Eligibility: Any single girl child, being the only child of her parents, is eligible to apply for the PG scholarship scheme. The scheme is applicable to such a single girl child who has taken admission to the first year master's degree programmes. The age of the girl student should not exceed 30 years at the time of admission. Scholarship Rates: Rs. 2,000/- per month for a period of two years only (10 months in the year) i.e. full duration of a PG course'
 13. Government of India National Scholarship (Merit): Eligibility : First class in the qualifying examination. Those who top the merit list within the quota allowed to the state will be eligible.
 14. Scholarship to the Physically Handicapped students: Scholarship amount: Degree students Rs. 1250/- per annum. P.G. Students Rs. 1700 per annum.
 15. Government of India Scholarship to the students from non - Hindi speaking state for Post metric studies in Hindi: Eligibility: Not less than 70% marks in the qualifying examination in the first attempt. The candidate should study Hindi as one of the subjects. The candidate whose mother tongue is Hindi is not eligible.
 16. State Scholarship: Scholarship amount for degree students Rs.1625/ - per annum. PG. students Rs. 750/- . Eligibility : 50% or above marks in the Plus Two or BA/B.Sc Examination. The annual income of the parent / guardian of the student should not exceed Rs 7,500/- (Degree student and Rs. 10,000-(P.G. Student.) The awardees will not be allowed to receive any other scholarship.
 17. Kerala University Merit Scholarship for B.A./B.Sc./B.Com students. Scholarship amount: Rs. 2500/- per annum and for PG students Rs. 3,000/- Per annum.

- Eligibility: Not less than 60% marks in the qualifying examination. Students enjoying any other scholarship are not eligible.
18. Student Aid Fund Scholarships from Kerala University Union: Scholarship amount Rs.750/- per annum for Degree students. Scholarship amount Rs.1,000/- per annum for PG. students. Eligibility: Students of Degree & PG. Classes whose parents' annual income does not exceed Rs. 1 0,000-Per annum.
 19. Harness fee concession: Eligibility : Children of Kerala Government Servants who die in harness or die within 6 months after retirement are eligible. The deceased should have had at least 5 years service under the State Government. Students enjoying any other fee concession or stipend except National Loan Scholarship are not eligible.
 20. Educational Concession to fishermen students Award : Rs. 400 per annum subject to the date of enrolment. Eligibility: Students of all classes belonging to fishermen community irrespective of income limit. The application forms are available at the office of the Regional Deputy Director of Fisheries, Kollam.
 21. Educational concession to the students belonging to the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and Other Eligible Communities including Kudumbies and Converts Award : For Degree students lump sum grant Rs. 950. Stipend : Rs 600/- per month for students who come from places beyond the distance of 8 km. and Rs. 530 per month for students who live within 8 km. PG students – lump sum grant Rs. 675, stipend as above. All students eligible for concession should apply in the prescribed forms with necessary documents within one month of their admission to the college.
 22. Educational concession to Socially and Educationally Backward Communities under KPCR: Award: Full fee concession for Degree students. Full fee concession, lumpsum grant and stipend for PG Students. Income limit: Rs. 1,00,000 per annum (Degree) and Rs. 1,00,000 per annum (PG). Applications are to be submitted within 15 days from the date of admission.
 23. Educational Concession to the Forward Communities under KPCR Award : Full fee concession for Degree and PG students. Income limit: Rs. 10,00,00 per annum (Degree)and PG.

DIVYANGJAN INCLUSIVITY POLICY

The Persons with Disabilities Act 1995 indicates that differently-abled persons should have access to education at all levels. In accordance with the Higher Education for Persons with Special Needs scheme started by the University Grants Commission during the Ninth Five-Year Plan, the institution endeavours to provide favourable infrastructure to differently-abled students and to create a conducive environment to enrich the higher education experiences of differently

abled persons or Divyangjans. Realising the social benefits of inclusivity, the institution works on facilitating inclusion of students with disabilities and making their learning environment accessible and sensitive to their individualized needs, reinforcing their confidence, dignity and quality of life.

SCOPE

The policy shall construct a barrier free environment that is conducive to their growth as students and professionals; it will also facilitate an inclusive culture in the campus with reference to students with disabilities, and also promote their living and learning with comfort and dignity.

CUSTODIAN OF THE POLICY

The heads of the departments, tutors and teachers shall ensure the implementation of the policy with regard to the curricular and co-curricular experiences of Divyangjan students. The administrative staff and the management shall work towards the improvement of the infrastructural and learning facilities in the college under the guidance of the Principal.

OBJECTIVES

- ❖ To ensure maintenance of a Divyangjan friendly learning atmosphere in the campus.
- ❖ To provide guidance and counselling to differently abled students.
- ❖ To create awareness about the needs of differently abled persons, and other general issues concerning their learning.
- ❖ To assist differently-abled students to gain successful employment in the public as well as private sectors.
- ❖ To ensure admission of as many differently-abled students as possible in the institution.

POLICY

- ❖ Admission of differently-abled students in various courses shall be facilitated and encouraged.
- ❖ Guidance and counselling shall be provided to differently abled individuals, to guarantee their academic, psychological and emotional well-being.
- ❖ Differently-abled students shall be assisted through career guidance and counselling to gain successful employment in the public as well as private sectors.
- ❖ Government and University orders dealing with fee concessions, examination procedures, reservation policies, etc., pertaining to differently-abled students

shall be congregated regularly, and timely action would be undertaken to ensure the implementation of the same.

- ❖ The educational needs of differently abled students shall be assessed to determine the types of assistive devices to be procured.
- ❖ The aptitude of differently-abled students in various fields shall be identified, and adequate motivation and coaching will be provided to hone their skills.
- ❖ Students shall be given awareness regarding the psychological, physical and emotional needs of Divyangjan students to inculcate the qualities of tolerance and inclusivity in them.
- ❖ Awareness programmes shall be conducted for teachers about the approaches to teaching, evaluation procedures, etc, which they should adopt in the case of differently abled students.
- ❖ It shall be ensured that all existing structures as well as future construction projects in the campus are made disabled friendly.
- ❖ Special facilities such as ramps, rails and special toilets shall be installed, and other necessary changes shall be made to suit the special needs of differently-abled students.
- ❖ Special learning equipment and software (such as screen reading software in the library) shall be installed and used to augment the learning experience of students with special needs.
- ❖ Assistance provided by the Institution to the differently abled students shall include Ramps & Railings, Assistance for Learning Resources, Medical Assistance, Human Assistance, Scribe facilities and wheel chair friendly Washrooms. Display boards exhibiting the facilities shall be fixed at prime points for information and enquiry.
- ❖ Sensitization and training at various levels for various stakeholders especially peers, teachers and staff shall be ensured in order to better accommodate the needs of differently abled students.

GENDER SENSITIZATION POLICY

Gender sensitization is a basic requirement to understand the sensitive needs of all genders. It helps us to examine our perspectives and question the so-called 'realities' that we have believed for long. The need for this sensitivity has been felt and realised more and more over the years, across the globe. Recent discourses focus upon the need to sensitise gender issues on campus as education is believed to be the catalyst for change. Educational spaces have the power to instil progressive thoughts in young minds, and thus mould dignified individuals who believe in equity and equality among all beings.

SCOPE

All students, teachers, teaching and non-teaching staff shall abide by the policy, and contribute towards the endeavour of the institution to ensure equality among all genders.

CUSTODIAN OF THE POLICY

Gender Sensitization Committee, All Department heads and the Women's Study Unit shall hold the responsibility of implementing the policy, under the guidance of the Principal.

OBJECTIVES

- ❖ To sensitize the students on the issue of gender discrimination.
- ❖ To familiarise the constitutional measures for gender equality to students and staff
- ❖ To create a teaching-learning-working environment which upholds the rights and freedom of all genders.
- ❖ Ensuring equity in opportunity to female and transgender students, teachers and staff and preventing any kind of abuse in the name of gender.

POLICY

- ❖ Equal opportunities shall be provided to male, female and transgender students and staff.
- ❖ The Internal Complaints Committee, Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti Ragging Cell will work stringently on the guidelines set by the UGC and the University to curb and take timely action against any form of violence against female students and staff.
- ❖ Orientation programmes shall be conducted by the departments and various clubs and committees under the leadership of Gender Sensitization Committee and Women Study Cell to impart awareness regarding gender sensitivity.
- ❖ Women empowerment activities shall be conducted by the Women's Study Unit.
- ❖ Higher representation of girl students shall be promoted in admissions to undergraduate and postgraduate courses. A higher female ratio in teaching staff also shall be appreciated.
- ❖ A higher female representation shall be ensured strictly in the College Union Election abiding to University norms. One representative from each class will compulsorily be a female student.
- ❖ Female students shall be encouraged to continue their studies after marriage, and ample motivation and assistance shall be provided to students during and after maternity period.

- ❖ Anti-Dowry campaigns and awareness classes shall be periodically conducted in association with forums of expertise for boys and girls.
- ❖ Psychological counselling shall be provided to female students and staff in need in order to ensure proper mental health and happiness.

INTERNAL COMPLAINTS COMMITTEE

- ❖ The committee shall be constituted comprising of a Convenor (a senior female faculty), at least two female faculty members, two non- teaching employees, a member from an NGO or a person familiar with sexual harassment issues and two student nominees.
- ❖ Convenor or any member of ICC shall receive the complaints of sexual harassment, if any, and shall co-ordinate the deliberations thereafter.
- ❖ On receipt of a complaint ICC shall conduct enquiry so as to ascertain the truth of the allegations by collecting the documentary evidence as well as recording statements of any possible witnesses including the complainant.
- ❖ The inquiry shall be completed within a period of ninety days from the date of the complaint.
- ❖ ICC shall then submit the enquiry report to the Principal within a period of ten days from the date of completion of the inquiry and such report be made available to the concerned parties.
- ❖ If the allegations against the respondent has been proved, it shall recommend punitive actions to be taken against the respondent.
- ❖ ICC shall take all steps necessary and reasonable to assist the affected person in terms of support and preventive action.
- ❖ ICC shall comply with the procedure prescribed in the aforementioned UGC Regulations 2015 and the Sexual Harassment Act for inquiring into the complaint in a time bound manner.
- ❖ The victim is assured of absolute confidentiality and privacy while the complaint is being enquired upon.
- ❖ The committee shall abide by the rules prescribed by the University and the UGC to hold meetings, make enquiries and form decisions regarding a complaint.
- ❖ If the ICC concludes that the allegations made were false, malicious or the complaint was made knowing it to be untrue, or forged or misleading information has been provided during the inquiry, the complainant shall be liable to be punished as per the above provisions.

ENVIRONMENT PROTECTION AND GREEN PROTOCOL POLICY

Humans have played a big role in the drastic change in the earth's climate over the last century, and scientists predict catastrophic problems if climate change goes unchecked. Higher education institutions have a very unique role in environmental protection: they help students become conscientious advocates for the environment, protecting it for themselves and generations to come. The college has constituted an Environment Conservation and Green Protocol Committee that strives to educate and inspire students on environmental issues, equipping them to make informed choices about the impact of their (and others) actions on the environment. The institution contributes to the State Government's Haritha Keralam Mission initiated in 2016, by implementing the Green Protocol and engaging in curricular and non-curricular activities aimed at effective waste management, environment conservation and sustainability.

SCOPE

The policy shall delineate the environment protection activities of the college, and shall be relevant to all stakeholders- students, teachers, administrative staff, parents, management and local neighbourhood.

CUSTODIAN OF THE POLICY

Environment Conservation Committee and Green Protocol Committee shall undertake the responsibility of implementing the policy, and shall coordinate its activities with the various departments, NCC, NSS, clubs and committees, under the leadership of the Principal and assistance of the management.

OBJECTIVES

- To ensure sustainable practices in campus, assuring acceptable air, water and soil quality in and around the campus
- Sree Narayana College, Chempazhanchy Academic Calendar 2022-23 To improve cleanliness in and around the campus through eco-friendly waste management system and sanitation scheme.
- To promote the concept of 3 R's- Reduce, Reuse and Recycle- among students, staff and local neighbourhood.
- To instil in students the awareness of the bio-diversity in the neighbourhood and the responsibility to conserve and protect the environment.

POLICY

Environment Friendly Activities

- The institution shall nurture a medicinal garden and a herbal garden, both

with indigenous medicinal herbs and shrubs with benefits proven in Ayurveda.

- A fruit garden shall be grown in the campus, with local fruit trees suitable for the soil.
- The 'Star Tree Grove' in the campus, a rare collection of 27 trees that are astrologically assigned to the different star signs, shall be nurtured and conserved with care.
- Organic farming shall be done by the National Service Scheme as a motivation and inspiration to students and the local community to participate in activities designed for sustainability.

ENVIRONMENT CONSERVATION

- Boundary walls shall be built and maintained around the trees in the Star Tree Grove.
- Recycling and reuse of water shall be encouraged.
- Rain water harvesting will be implemented, and the recycled water shall be used for laboratory and irrigation purposes.
- Soil erosion shall be minimised by planting of trees, and quality of soil shall be maintained.
- Planting of trees and nurture of existing flora shall be encouraged.
- Energy audit will be done annually to evaluate and improve energy consumption status of the institution.

GREEN PROTOCOL

- Use of vehicles inside the campus will be restricted to maintain carbon neutrality.
- Students shall not be allowed to bring their vehicles inside, and are expected to avail the parking space near the gate.
- A systematic waste management system shall be implemented in which wastes are collected, segregated, recycled or disposed suitably, without harm to the environment. Incinerator, biogas plants and waste segregation bins shall be used for the purpose.
- Separate Bins shall be provided in the campus to segregate and collect food waste and non biodegradable waste material.
- Use of reusable food containers instead of paper and plastic will be made mandatory.
- Use of plastic in any form shall be banned inside the campus.
- Use of flex banners and plastic decorations during programmes and celebrations shall not be permitted.
- Water bottle refill stations shall be installed inside the campus to reduce the careless disposal of plastic water bottles.
